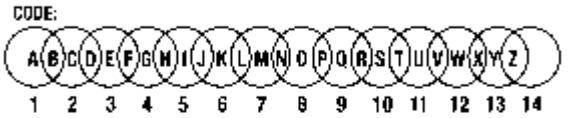

| 1 pound ground beef | 1 tablespoon parsley flakes |
| 1 cup sliced carrots | 1 cup frozen green beans |
| 1 cup sliced onion | ¼ cup uncooked regular rice |
| 1 cup sliced celery | 2 16 ounce cans stewed tomatoes |
| 1 cove garlic, minced | 1 teaspoon salt |
| 1 15 ounce can kidney beans | ¼ teaspoon basil |
| 3 ½ cups water | 1/8 teaspoon pepper |
| 5 beef bouillon cubes | |



Range top – 55 minutes cooking time. Makes 3 quarts.
 Cook ground beef, onion and garlic until beef is browned. Drain off any fat. Add remaining ingredients except green beans. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer, covered, 40 minutes. Add green beans. Continue simmering 10 minutes, until vegetables are tender.

#1. Every person can belong to our Heavenly Master.

Tucker and Dudley each had their pictures posted on NextDayPets.com (years apart) when they were puppies... and their master chose them. None of the puppies had a choice of a master. People have a choice. We can choose to accept Jesus as our Master. Our Master can never have too many people belonging to him. We are called to belong to Jesus Christ. (Romans 1:6)

#2. Every person can communicate with his Master.

When Tucker and Dudley were brought to their new home as puppies, they had to learn communication with their master. They learned the master's voice, touch, and demonstrations of love. They began to communicate in return: wiggle, wag the tail, bark, curl up close on the loveseat.

Jesus, our Master, knows every language. He will hear and understand prayers from all over the world. (1 Peter 3:12) If we want to hear our Master speak to us, we should try finding a quiet place with no interruptions. Then tell Him that we are listening. And then listen. More than our ears may become involved in the communication.

#3. Every person should obey his Master.

Tucker and Dudley, as puppies, had a lot to learn. If they were to avoid accidents, or avoid getting lost, or avoid being afraid... they had to do what their master said. They had to be obedient.

What is obedience? It is doing what we are told... even if we don't want to do it. Jesus, our Master, would not tell us to do something if it wasn't good for us. And... if we love our Master, we will, "walk in obedience to his commands." (2 John, verse 6) So let it be. Selah.
