Hi. This is Dudley. Yes, I'm still around... but I'm confused. Things are so different. I don't know what to expect. My daily life has changed.

Since the global pandemic hit home, I have not been able to visit at Cuba's senior residence, or go to church, or even leave the house. I miss my friends, and there are days when I can't even communicate very much with my master.

Visiting at our town's senior residence gave me a chance to meet new people and get lots of attention. I made the people smile... and they enjoyed petting me. But I have not been there in months. What is my purpose now, when I am stuck at home?

I used to go to church on prayer days and movie nights. The prayer group members are like family... and the people at movie night became new friends. What is my purpose now, when I am stuck at home?

Lately the days have been sunny, and I've been able to go out in the yard on nice days. Then the weather turned cold and I didn't stay out long. I've been taking more naps. Also, my master doesn't seem to be around as much. Maybe I am imagining that. Maybe my master is talking with someone else. (I have been breaking some rules.) Is my master leaving me? What is my purpose, now that I am stuck at home?

I am getting bored and restless. My master says I am reverting to bad habits in the house. And when I am let outdoors, into the yard, I bark as loud and as long as I can. I know that my master is not pleased when I go back to immature ways. So, what is my purpose now, when I am stuck at home?

When my master and I are alone, and in a quiet place, my master communicates with me. Sometimes it is with words, and sometimes it is with a feeling of love and warmth enveloping me. At those times, my master communicates that I am an unique and special creature. 'That there is a purpose for my existence.

In times of isolation, and during days that have no agenda or deadlines... my master communicates that I must be obedient. I must be patient. And I must think of others. To me, being obedient means to stop barking when I am told to do so. Being patient means to sit still until I am given supper. And, thinking of others means to lick a hand or a toe.

I think, maybe, what your Master wants you to do (during your isolation) is:

- 1. Be obedient by praying and seeking your Master's will.
- 2. Be patient... as you wait for this pandemic to pass, and as you inter-act with other people.
- 3. Be thoughtful of others... communicate your love through word and deed.

My master loves me... and your Master loves you!

An informal **Management Team meeting** was held Wednesday evening, June 24 in the church sanctuary to **discuss reopening the church** and what is required to keep everyone safe.

The 6 page document "UNY Church Reopening Guidelines" gives the New York State requirements such as everyone must wear a mask, sit at least 6 feet apart (families may sit together), no bulletins, no singing, people must enter and exit through different doors etc. Signage has to be posted throughout the church etc. All Bibles, hymnals, pencils and envelopes must be removed from the pews and stored away.

The pews need to be marked off for proper seating. What doors to use to enter and exit the building and the method of leaving the sanctuary after the services was discussed. Also discussed were the special requirements for serving Communion.

The required hand sanitizer stations to be placed in the church and at the restrooms have been pre-ordered and delivery is expected the last of July.

Deep cleaning before and after the services was discussed.

Because of the current restriction that churches are allowed to operate at only 25% seating capacity (which would limit us to around 25 people in our sanctuary), it was decided to hold another meeting on July 22, 2020 at 6:00 to further discuss reopening and see if anything has changed.

If in the mean time, the seating limit is raised to at least 50%, a special meeting of the Management Team will be called.
