

Case in point: One of our own church family members related a story that exhibits that very fact. Jane's parents divorced when she was young and she has a step-brother from her mother's remarriage, and a step-sister from her father's remarriage. Now keep in mind that the only link that these two people have is Jane. They aren't connected in any other way. As often happens in families, there were problems between siblings as the parents were aging and passing away. Jane had not been in contact with her step-sister who lives in Florida nor with her step-brother who lives in Arkansas for many years. Time passes as it often does and Jane realized that she missed these two people being a part of her life, so she started praying about it. She ask God to repair the damage and bring them back into her life. About 3 weeks ago she was at her home, lying on the couch watching T.V. when someone knocked on her door. When she opened the door, it was her step-sister from Florida. She told Jane that she had been all over Cuba looking for her and just wanted to apologize for the argument that they had when Dad was ill. They went all over looking up old friends and enjoying each other's company. They went into the Kopper Keg that evening for dinner and while they were eating Jane's cell phone rang. It was her stepbrother from Arkansas calling to apologize. Now if you don't have "goose bumps" right now then you need to read this again. He had no idea that Jane's step-sister was there, he has no relationship with her, so there is no way that they could have known what was happening. Jane was ecstatic with the answer to her prayer. The moral of the story (in case you missed it) is that prayer works.

We also thank you for your many donations that we were able to take with us to help those in need. The list of needs continues and we begin our planning for the next trip in two years. 




Author Christopher Webber will speak at the Cuba Circulating Library on Wednesday September 28 at 7pm. Webber's latest book is "American to the Backbone" the incredible story of a forgotten hero of nineteenth century America, a former slave named James Pennington, who became a Yale scholar, congregational pastor and international leader of the Antebellum abolitionist movement. In 1927, at the age of 19, scared and illiterate, Pennington escaped and soon became one of the leading voices against slavery prior to the Civil War. As he fought for equal rights in America, Pennington's voice was not just limited to the pulpit. He wrote the first History of the Colored People as well as a careful study of the moral basis for civil disobedience. More than a century before Rosa Parks took her famous bus ride, Pennington challenged segregated seating on NYC street cars. The author's father was in charge of Episcopal churches in Cuba, Friendship and Angelica from 1929 1949. The author lived in Cuba until 1946 when he left for school. He is a retired Rector and Vicar who has served churches in NY, Connecticut and Japan. He has many fond memories of his childhood in Cuba and

Please begin thinking prayerfully, progressively, and proportionally about your giving.
