ADULT SUNDAY BIBLE STUDIES with Cheryl

October 20, 2018 changed my life forever. It also changed the lives of my husband, our daughter, our son-in-law and our two grandsons. It was the night that our fifteen-year-old grandson took his own life.

Shock, confusion and tears filled the days ahead. There seemed to be a hole in our hearts that could not be filled. 'But, with time, God is filling and mending our hearts.

At the Remembrance Service, we sang Hymn of Promise (P.707) which I later shared with the Adult Sunday Class. Verse four says, "In our end is our beginning; in our time, infinity; in our doubt there is believing; in our life, eternity. In our death a resurrection; at the last, a victory, unrevealed until its season, something God alone can see."

Yes, when our earthly life ends, it will truly be a new beginning. Yes, when our time comes, we will experience infinity. Yes, when we doubt, it can be turned into believing through faith. Yes, in our life, we can have the hope of eternity in our hearts through Jesus. Yes, in our death there is a resurrection for Believers. Yes, in the Believer's last breath there is victory, because the Lord has overcome Death. All these things are unrevealed to the Christian now, but will be revealed when it is time. Only God can see all things now. But we can believe what God's word tells us... and the Bible says, "Believe in the Lord Jesus Christ and you will be saved." (Acts 16:31)

Our class also looked up Bible verses of comfort and hope. I share them with you here:

"May your unfailing love be my comfort, according to your promise" (Psalm 119:76)

"I will wait for the Lord, my soul waits, and in his word I put my hope" (Psalm 130:5)

"Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in Prayer" (Romans 12:12)

"Rejoice with those who rejoice; mourn with those who mourn" (Romans 12:15)

May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit" (Romans 15:13)

"Love does not delight in evil, but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres" (1 Corinthians 13:6-7)

"Now faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see" (Hebrews 11:1)

I believe I will see Charlie again, in the future. For now, I rest upon the promises of God. And I am grateful for my Christian friends who have been the arms and hands of Jesus, supporting our extended family in our time of sorrow.

Dudley has been behaving differently lately, Usually he is rather predictable: first thing in the morning he wants out... then breakfast, and then a short nap on the loveseat. Later he will "woof" to go out... and in... and out... On days that we visit at the hospital, he gets well brushed and taken to the car. He finds all this predictable. Other predictable routines are: watching me feed the chickens, giving him supper, and taking him for a walk. But, the routine that he doesn't like is when I hurry to the door, go start the car, and drive away. He never

knows how long I will be gone.

If I have been gone a long time, or (especially) if I have been gone somewhere each day for several days in a row, Dudley becomes clingy. He doesn't like me to be out of his sight. If I get up, he gets up. If I go upstairs, he follows me upstairs. If I am moving about the kitchen, he is always under-foot. He seems to fear a separation from his master, but doesn't know what to do about it. He becomes uneasy, and sometimes depressed.

Many of us have experienced something similar. We feel at a distance from our Master. We haven't experienced His presence for a while. We long for His voice and His touch. We also, may become uneasy or depressed.

Do not expect your Master to drive back to your house, enter, and call your name, like I do with Dudley. But, there are things that we can do, to feel our Master's presence with us, and to become calm and secure. They are:

- 1. Be still (Psalm 46:10) Just be still. No talking. No background noise. No napping.
- 2. Call upon Him. (Psalm 145:18) Use His name. Jesus, Lord, Savior, Redeemer, Good Shepard, Counselor, Lover of my soul.
- 3. Cast your anxieties on Him. (1 Peter 5:7) (Philippians 4:6) Don't hold them in. Let Him carry your burdens. Let Him give you relief.

Earth is not perfect. At sometime in our lives we will feel discouraged, lonely, overworked, overwhelmed, or unloved. Do not give in to despair. Our Lord Jesus came to give us life. And life abundantly. Amen!

News from the Cuba Council of Churches:

The Crop Walk earned a total of \$4245.18. Some goes to World hunger projects, much of it stays here.

Food Pantry Report. Food assistance was given twice in Sept., six times in Oct., and twice so far in Nov. Gas assistance was only used once in the three month period. Since the Food Pantry is very full now but will be emptied on Distribution Day, people were asked to continue to remind congregations of food needs throughout the winter.

Holiday Assistance Report. The goal of \$14,000 necessary has almost been reached. Family Dollar, Cuba Pharmacy Gift Nook and Cuba Giant Food Mart will participate in the program this year by accepting gift vouchers. November 23 is the firm cutoff date for families to apply for Holiday Assistance. Drop off Day for new toys and new and gently used clothes is Dec. 10 at the First Baptist Church. CRCS Elementary School students will bring their donations to the Church on the 10th at 8:45am. The CRCS football team will move food pantry items from the basement up to the Church Hall on the 10th. Sorting day is the following day, Dec. 11. All churches are asked to send helpers from 8am-10:30. Distribution Day is Thursday Dec. 13, from 8:30-11:30, and again from 6-7:30. Again, volunteers from all churches are needed. All who donate to the Holiday Assistance Fund are in a drawing for a free family portrait by Williamson Photography. The winner will be drawn at the Thanksgiving-Advent Service on Nov. 25. Also new this year is a gift of a tote bag from White Imprints to all who donate a nonperishable item to the Food Pantry.

The Escroban Family Concert on Oct. 21 earned a love offering of \$912 for the refugee family. About 40 were in attendance at NPWC.

The Thanksgiving Advent (ThankVent) Service on Nov 25 will be hosted by First Baptist and Rev. Sullivan will give the message. Other churches will participate in parts of the service. Nettie White will direct the choir, hopefully with members from all Cuba churches' choirs.

New members were elected for the Scholarship Committee, which will give a \$500 college scholarship in June. Mary Hupp agreed to accept the nominations from High School Seniors who live or worship in the CR School District. A committee of Hupp, Sullivan and Cusumano, will review applications and recommend a recipient.

Church families are invited to participate in the Chamber of Commerce sponsored Small Town Christmas on Dec 1 in several ways: by making cookies for Santa's arrival at Genesee Park at 5pm...and for families to loan unusual Nativity Scenes to the Chamber to have on display at their Office all day on Dec. 1st.

North Park Wesleyan will be participating in a **Small Town Christmas on Dec. 1** by providing a Living Nativity at Chamberlain Park from 6-8pm. Several scenes from the Nativity Story will be depicted throughout the Park. The narration will be broadcast on the internet which can be accessed from a smart phone as you drive around the Park.
